OWATONNA — The Highway 14 Partnership is going to make a bid for federal funding in an effort bid for federal funding in an occurrence to accelerate the expansion of Highway 14 from Rochester to

Mankato.

million in Federal Demonstration
Funds for a section of highway

Mankato city manager Pat Hentges unveiled the plan Friday at a Highway 14 Partnership meet-ing Friday at Owatonna's Holiday

Inn.

The Highway 14 Partnership is a nonprofit group attempting to keep the expansion project in front of Minnesota state law makers.

The stretch of highway has experienced 27 fatalities, which is much higher than the state average for other similar highways. Hentges contends that should be Hentges contends that should be an eye-catcher in congress especially since the highway pleads to Rochester, home of one of the best

medical clinics in the world - the Mayo Clinic. Hentges also pointed out other features making Highway 14 a prime candidate for federal funding. Those are:

· The project has the largest group support of any project in Minnesota. The Highway 14 Partnership has 48 affiliates and 25 local government members.

• Highway 14 has been identified, for the second consecutive year, as the worst non-metro highway in Minnesota.
